

Walking Boldly Together

Borne of urgency and fueled by compassion, Companis advances social justice through the ever-radical idea of supporting people who show up for one another, soulfully offering their professional talents, personal encouragement and caring hearts in volunteer service to their neighbors. And the result?

Companis volunteer and stipendsupported placements have served 163 nonprofits over the past quarter century. From September 2018 to September 2019, Companis partnered with 39 area agencies, and made 88 placements of 62 Companis Workers, professionals whose talents help create healthy communities for all.

So, where did we start? A man looked around his Chicago community in 1983, and asked himself, "What's going on?" He watched in disbelief what was happening to his neighbors: Central American refugees fleeing civil war who were denied asylum and basic rights; a deadly virus – not yet known as HIV/AIDS – fueled such fear that its victims and families were abandoned and isolated. So much was wrong that Craig Darling was inspired to launch the Esther Davis Center to bridge the gaps that exclude people from healthy community.

His idea flourished. Craig was recruited to bring his model to Seattle. In 1994, welcomed and nurtured by the caring congregation at Seattle First Baptist Church, Companis was born. Our Latin name, which means "to share bread together" in hospitality, undergirds our values of inclusion, service, relationship, compassion and reflection.

It's through our values we look around our community today and ask ourselves, "What's going on?" We see poverty, illness and exclusion. We see entire communities targeted because of fear and ignorance. We see our own government perpetuating and instigating injustices.

The themes are strikingly similar to the time of our founding: exclusion of 'the other,' ethnic and religious intolerance, widening gaps in access to health care and rampant economic disparity, to name a few. That's why in 2019 you'll find Companis Workers in refugee advocacy services, shelters and homelessness prevention agencies, health and wellness centers, LGBTQ advocacy, and more!

Every day of the year, a Companis Worker is engaging their heart, mind and hands to make our community healthier and stronger. And here's the Companis magic: to sustain their service, our reflection-based support program offers nurture and inspiration. "Companis emphasizes that we're more than just workers doing a job," says Heidi Toppel, placed as business manager with Diverse Harmony, the nation's first queer-straight alliance youth chorus. "Indeed, Companis makes sure its volunteers know that everything we do matters."

Companis honors Wakefield with 2019 Newell Award



With our genus rooted as one early response to the HIV/AIDS crisis, it's with gratitude the Companis Board of Directors honors global HIV/AIDS prevention champion and leader Wakefield with the 2019 Janet G. Newell Award for Community Service.

Wakefield is with the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, and serves as the External Relations Director for the HIV Vaccine Trials Network and leads global efforts for stakeholder engagement. He's also the founder of The Legacy Project, a program to increase racial and ethnic population involvement in trials.

Wakefield currently serves on the AVAC: Global HIV Prevention Board and is an HIV-negative health care advocate with over thirty-five years of involvement in projects that increase community participation in HIV prevention research and ethics. A longtime human rights and HIV activist with nonprofit management, public service on Chicago's Board of Health, as well as global and U.S. advisory groups such as WHO's UNAIDS and the NIH-funded HPTN Ethics Working Group, Wakefield is passionate about implementation of evidence-based strategies to end the epidemic.

Wakefield and Companis go way back to our Chicago roots. He was a supporter of the Esther Davis Center, the precursor to Companis. Wakefield and Companis Founder Craig Darling both were involved in HIV awareness and prevention programs, working to break down stigmas and discrimination.

Thank you, Wakefield, for all you have done and continue to do, on a global basis, to end AIDS.
